

Resources on Alcoholism

IT IS OBVIOUS from the many inquiries which we have been receiving during the year that the problem of alcoholism is a very important one in the area of the minister's pastoral care and pastoral counseling. Not only is it important, it is also extremely difficult, presenting the minister with what often seem insuperable problems. During the last few years a number of highly specialized agencies have been developed throughout the country—agencies which should prove extremely useful to the minister in being of greater value to the alcoholic and his family.

Most of these resources have been developed under the stimulation and guidance of the National Committee on Alcoholism and its Executive Director, Mrs. Marty Mann, through whose courtesy the following directory is being published.—*Ed.*

We list below 48 Local Committees

on Alcoholism which are available for consultation to ministers in the various areas throughout the United States and Canada, as well as 89 Out-Patient Alcoholism Clinics for the treatment of alcoholism. 29 of the Local Committees have fully developed Information Centers. These are marked *. One of the major goals of the National Committee is to help the rest of the local committees develop similar Information Centers.

Out-Patient Alcoholism Clinics

In October 1953, the National Committee on Alcoholism published the first official directory of out-patient clinics for alcoholics. The labor of compiling and checking this information, a most formidable and time-consuming research project, was undertaken by our regular staff as a public service. NCA is a service agency—the only national clearing-house for information regarding all phases of the alcoholic problem—and as such is the recipient of thousands of inquiries per month. Inquiries regarding treatment facilities have increased even faster than the growth in number of such facilities. It was obvious that an orderly compilation of available information was desperately needed.

Our first problem was to define the area in which we could hope to make such an orderly compilation. An attempt to locate, check, and list the steadily increasing hundreds of doctors qualified, willing and able to treat alcoholics, was obviously beyond the scope of our limited personnel.

The same was true for hospitals, which presented the added difficulty of drawing the fine line between the specialized hospital, the private nursing home, and the myriad so-called "rest homes" including the questionable "cures." We felt, however, that a directory of the great and growing number of accredited General Hospitals offering treatment for acute alcoholics, either in a special ward or wing, or by making regular rooms available for this type of patient, should eventually be compiled, but was too vast and complicated a task for us to undertake without a special research grant and staff.

So we arrived at our chosen area: the out-patient clinic, especially for al-



But as we sent questionnaires and received replies, we realized that this field was developing literally before our eyes. By September 1953 we had information on 79 alcoholic clinics, including several Alcoholic Services located in Mental Hygiene Clinics in North Carolina; it is both interesting and heartening to note that this year's Directory of Out-patient Alcoholism Clinics lists 89 clinics—a gain of 10 in one year.
